

Birger Hendriks is Director General for Higher Education and Research and Deputy State Secretary in the Land Schleswig-Holstein (Germany). He is Member of the Conference of Directors General for Higher Education, and former Member of the Steering Committee for the development of a German Qualifications Framework for Lifelong Learning. He is German Representative to the Bologna Process, Member of the Bologna Follow-up Group, and recently became German Representative in the General Assembly of EQAR (European Quality Assurance Register for Higher Education). In addition he is Head of the National Coordination Group for the implementation of the Bologna Process. Birger Hendriks has published works on university management and on the development and implementation of the Bologna Process, and contributed to numerous national and international events such as symposia, conferences of UNESCO, IIEP, Council of Europe, DAAD, German Rector's Conference.



Sophia Eriksson Waterschoot is a Swedish official working in the European Commission since 1996. She is currently Head of Sector Higher Education policy in the Unit for "Higher Education; Erasmus" in the Education and Culture Directorate General. Previous work in the Commission includes employment policy, in particular the European employment strategy and the European Social Fund, strategic planning and indicators. Sophia Eriksson Waterschoot studied economics, business administration and political science at Uppsala University and Stockholm University, Sweden. She did an Erasmus exchange at University of Montpellier, France and she has a Master's degree in European studies from Université Catholique de Louvain, Belgium.



Claus Hviid Christensen is Chief Executive Officer, Lindoe Offshore Renewables Center since 2010. Previously, he was Vice President for Emerging Technology at Haldor Topsøe A/S and prior to that Director for Danish National Research Foundation Center for Sustainable and Green Chemistry at the Technical University of Denmark. Claus Hviid Christensen has been co-initiator of the establishment of Science Cup Denmark, an inventor competition in biology, chemistry and physics for high school students. He is an internationally acclaimed researcher in chemistry and catalysis with more than 170 scientific papers and 44 patent families. One of these patents was the starting point for a hydrogen tablet, which can store storing hydrogen or ammonia and this opens new perspectives for future energy and environmental technologies.



Børge Diderichsen is Vice-president of Corporate Research Affairs, Novo Nordisk. His primary tasks are to help to formulate Novo Nordisk's view on research policy issues, to interact with relevant ministries, trade organisations, the European Commission and other organisations, and develop partnerships with universities and other research institutions. Børge Diderichsen is member of the board of Novo Nordisk – Chinese Academy of Sciences Research Foundation and co-chairman of Shanghai Institutes for Biological Sciences – Novo Nordisk Translational Centre for Prediabetes and one of the founders of ScanBalt bioregion. He has a considerable network in Denmark and abroad. Over the past 15 years, he has been engaged in contacts to important Chinese scientists and senior officials at for instance the Chinese Academy of Sciences and Chinese Academy of Medical Sciences. Currently, he spends much of his time and energy to use these contacts and experiences to help Novo Nordisk expand its R&D activities in China.



Christoph Anz is BMW Group Director responsible for Education Policy of the company (2007-) and senior advisor at the Confederation of the German Employers' Associations. For a number of years Christoph Anz was Deputy Director of the department for Education and Vocational Training. His main activities were in the field of higher education policy both nationally and in the European context, he was engaged in the so-called Copenhagen and the Bologna processes. Mati Heidmets is Professor of Tallinn University, Chairman of the Evaluation Board of Estonian Higher Education Quality Agency, former rector of Tallinn University. He is a well-known researcher in Estonia dealing with higher education issues, as well as a political actor in this field, initiating the establishment of Tallinn University in 2005 as well as promoting the quality assurance system in Estonian higher education. He has also been editor of Estonian Human Development Reports and is currently leading the team preparing new educational strategy for the country.



Henrik Wolff, Rector of Arcada, University of Applied Sciences. Since 1987, he has served as CEO of Stiftelsen Arcada Foundation and since 1995 as President of Arcada, University of Applied Sciences. Professionally, Henrik Wolff is as President on the Swedish Academy of Engineering Sciences in Finland since 2007. He has been a Board member of the Rectors' Conference of Finnish Universities of Applied Sciences during the periods 1997 - 2001 and 2004 2006 and 2010 he was elected Vice President. Henrik Wolff held a position as Chairman of the Board of the Employers' Educational Confederation during the period 2004 - 2007. He also has an appointment as the Finnish representative of The Nordic Council of Ministers, coperation in Quality and Development in Nordic Higher Education since 2008. In addition, he serves as President of the European Network for Universities of Applied Sciences (UASNET) since 2009. This informal and thematic network focuses on the clarification of the profile of UAS in Europe.



Rimantas Vaitkus graduated at Vilnius University, Lithuania in 1980. He received PhD in chemistry. He had Tempus grant in Uppsala University, Sweden in 1996 as well as American Chemical Society scholarship in Creighton University, Nebraska, USA (1997). Currently he is Vice-Rector for International Affairs of Vilnius University. He is an author of numerous publications in chemistry and educational policy, as well as an author of number of text-books.



Maria Mendel is Pro-Rector for Educational Affairs, professor at the institute of Education and director at the Department of Social Pedagogy Gdansk University. Her interests focus on social animation and community education, and on local educational partnerships. Her recent research explores social construction and the pedagogy of places and displacements. Among her research projects is the EU FP5 project: Students as Journeymen between communities of Higher Education and Work which aimed to enhance the understanding of learning strategies, values and worldviews that students and novices apply within and across different learning environments - both in education and in working life. It aimed to gain an understanding of students' experiences of transitions from higher education to professional life in different European countries. In particular, it focused on the cultural diversity of academic and work institutions in Europe.
